

Visit to Callaghan Motors – Sunday 24th June.

Visit to the new Callaghan Motors by Murray Murfett

Steve Callaghan welcomed around 60 Club members to their new car dealership on Raglan Pde for our June Monthly Run. Assisted by Club Member Robbie Lee, we were shown all through the premises which were opened up especially for us on a Sunday afternoon. Many of those present remembered the site when it was a drive-in theatre, before becoming a Mitre 10 store, and then briefly owned by TAFE before being transformed into what must be the most up to date and innovative dealership in Australia. In fact 4 separate dealerships under the one roof - Holden, Mitsubishi, Suzuki and Mercedes-Benz. Steve said that complying with the wishes of each of the 4 competing companies was quite a juggling act.



A recent extension of the Mercedes-Benz range was the addition of commercial vehicles- V Class vans and 4WD's. A touch screen innovation in the showroom allowed a client to 'build' their own Mercedes-Benz car, with their desired model, colour, style and accessories. Out the back in the servicing area was quite an experience. Sixteen hoists, all connected to an autofeed bulk oil system and 10 specialised computers that can 'talk' to the car for diagnostic assessment and software programming. The area was spotless, with not a drop of oil to be seen, (possibly on



account of there being no English cars serviced there!) The separated Caravan and 4WD showroom was also impressive, with TJM and New age Caravans on display, and up to 50% of sales occurring externally, at caravan and camping shows.

However the real highlight for many Club members and former employees was the 35 metre long, locally produced 'history' wall. Text and images depicted the history of the business going back to 1883, with early connections to Robinson & Morse, and then 3 generations of Callaghans (Frank, Brian & now Steve), plus several early scenes of Warrnambool, motor vehicles, staff, notable achievements and other timelines. In farewelling us, Steve extended a welcome "to come back any time!"



The ultimate club/family wagon:

This 100-year-old Silver Ghost Rolls Royce has sold for a world-record price of \$5 million after a furious bidding war at Bonhams.

It was originally bought for \$1,000 in 1912 (almost 93,000 in today's money) but has now gone under the hammer for \$4,705,500, making it the most expensive Rolls- Royce ever sold at auction.



Through the roof: The lengthy auction saw two enthusiasts duelling for the pristine car as the bidding went up in increments of 100,000, smashing past the 2 million estimate.

In great nick: The six-cylinder, 7.3-litre car comes with perfect provenance and is still purring smoothly, doing about 15 miles to the gallon.

What it lacks in gadgetry, the British-made classic more than compensates for with an extraordinary level of luxury that leaves its modern-day counterparts looking a little unsophisticated.







Its gleaming interior fittings are made of silver

and ivory, while the door panels are embroidered silk, with brocade tassels attached to silk window shades for privacy.

Travelling in style: The design chosen by its original owner echoed the luxurious 'Pullman 'Railway carriages pioneered by American George Pullman.

Luxurious: The elegant passenger compartment (left) complete with 29 beveled glass windows and (right) the stylish steering wheel.

THE PASSENGER FOOT REST HIDES A FULL PICNIC SET FOR FOUR, A CHINA TEA SERVICE, COMPLETE WITH AN ALCOHOL-FUELLED BURNER AND KETTLE TO HEAT THE WATER, AND A SET OF SIX DECANTERS – THREE IN STERLING SILVER AND THREE IN LEATHER-WRAPPED GLASS.

The sale took place at the Goodwood Festival of Speed in West Sussex on Friday Auctioneers had expected it to sell for around 2million and were astonished when the bidding between two rival collectors topped 4million. James Knight, from Bonhams auctioneers, said: There were three bidders, then one of them dropped out at 2.3million and we thought it would end there.

But then another bidder entered and the bidders were duelling. It went up in increments of 50,000, and then 100,000, and then back down to 50,000.

It went on and on and on and was the longest car sale I have ever witnessed. It was pure theatre. Everyone was very respectful but when the price reached a milestone, like 3million, there was an intake of breath.

The bidders were duelling and when the hammer came down there was spontaneous applause. It was fitting because the car is celebrating her centenary.



The car was commissioned by Rolls Royce connoisseur John M. Stephens, who also bought the first Silver Ghost the luxury car-maker produced in 1906. The body was built by former royal carriage-maker Barker's of Mayfair, which had previously built coaches for King George III and Queen Victoria.





The car even had an early speedometer – an important addition given that a 20 mph speed limit was introduced in 1912. Unlike most car enthusiasts of his time, Mr. Stephens, from Croydon, South London, asked the makers not to include a glass division window between the driver and the passengers as he wanted to drive it himself rather

than rely on a chauffeur.

The car's distinctive cream and green design echoed the luxury Pullman Railway carriages of the time, and it was known as a Double Pullman Limousine.

But it was nicknamed the Corgi Silver Ghost in the 1960s after the toy-maker based its Silver Ghost toy car on this model.

Mr. Stephens's car is believed to be the only one of its kind to survive with its full interior and bodywork, as many Rolls Royce's from the era were converted into ambulances during the First World War.

Around the Traps

• Well there is certainly plenty of generosity around at the moment. And it seems that generosity is a two-way street with our members. A return visit by one couple to Callaghan Motors the day after the Club visit resulted in their purchase of a Mercedes Benz, and another member returned the day after our visit to Foodshare, to make a substantial donation towards their good work.

- Guest speakers at out June meeting were Fred Dosser and his team from the Packard Club (Vic), who are
 planning a National Rally in Warrnambool in March/April next year. We were given a brief but enthusiastic
 history of the Packard company, which commenced in Detroit in 1899-1956 and built cars, trucks and RollsRoyce Merlin aircraft engines under licence. Around 35 cars are expected for a week-long hub rally. Further
 contact will be made with us to determine what assistance we can offer.
- Our popular battery drive will again be held to raise further funds towards our Clubrooms project. Old car, truck & tractor batteries may be left at the Clubrooms, for collection by 'Scoota' Serra on 22 July.

Monthly Donations to Foodshare Needed!

Following our visit to Warrnambool Foodshare last month, there was discussion amongst some of our members on ways that we could offer more support. This was further discussed at our June General Meeting and a popular decision was made to collect donations of food at our General Meetings, until the end of the year. Popular foods needed by Foodshare include canned foods (soups, baked beans, fruits, Milo etc), spreads (jams, vegemite, peanut butter etc), pastas, noodles and other non-putrescible foods. Murray Murfett will co-ordinate this and boxes will be available at the meetings. A cash donation jar will also be available. Fresh fruit &vegetables can be delivered directly to Foodshare, located in Rooneys Rd.

More Clubrooms Progress

- Members visiting the Clubrooms project will notice that the new walls are now wrapped in blue building paper
 and the wiring has been roughed in, with plumbing to follow. Inside the main room, the new plaster ceiling is
 complete and painting has commenced. The ceiling insulation is back in place and modifications to widen the
 front door will commence shortly.
- Council have approved both the Stormwater Management Plan (which deals with provisions for heavy rainfall) and the Road Reserves Works Permit (improvements to the entrance off Ziegler Pde). Both of these were Planning requirements. A Levels Plan can now be drawn up drawn up, which will give guidance to the ground levels required for the formation of the parking area and run-off for drainage. Major earthworks for this part of the project will be required however already there have been extremely generous offers to assist with levelling the site, removal and carting away of the overburden, supply of gravel and the use of big machinery to carry out these works. These offers have come from our own Club members and we are indeed very lucky to receive their generous support.

- Recent Grants from the Tom O'Toole Foundation (\$3,000) and the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal /
 Gardiner Foundation (\$5,000) brings the total of our Grants up to \$28,750! A further 5 Grants are "in the
 works" and a further 4 applications are being investigated.
- Arrangements will be made where suitable for members to visit the Clubrooms project during the monthly
 Sunday and mid-week runs however there is action happening there at most times during the week and any

A Man of Vision or A Nutter!

An article from "The Radiator" in September 1937 was titled REVOLUTIONARY CAR – Safety Problem Tackled.

Granville Bradshaw (1887 - 1969) was a British engineer who designed many motorcycle and aero engines but many of his designs had flaws. He also designed the rear suspension of the Bond Minicar (3 wheeler) and was the co-founder of ABC cars.

His ideas on the perfectly safe car for motorists and pedestrians, cyclists etc were as follows:-

The car would have a driving position placed much further forward than that of the ordinary private car. This forward driving position is to be seen in practice in some commercial vehicles and in rear-engined passenger cars. Its layout, to provide the glancing blow for what would otherwise be the head-on collision, involves tapering both ends almost to a point, the plan view of the car resembling an egg with with two pointed ends, and no outside projections. To carry this out obviously requires the abolition of paired wheels at the ends..

At each end is placed a single wheel, both of them being directionally controlled by the steering gear, but unbraked. This provides a very positive directional control, uncomplicated by the possibility of lost control through the steered wheels locking when braked.

Stability is given by paired wheels amidships, which would be both power-driven and braked, the complete engine and transmission mechanism being placed in the middle of the car above this axle, which is similar to the normal rear axle. Practically perfect weight distribution is thus obtained, and the loading of the centre wheels is such that the braking effect possible from them would be equivalent to that now obtainable from four-wheel brakes.

With the engine projecting through the floorboards into the centre of the car body comes the question of body space. Mr Bradshaw states that an engine need not be more than 10 inches wide, and suggests that its position may prove an advantage, since it would be easy to enclose satisfactorily. His design shows four forward facing chairs placed around the engine cover, which forms a table, the driver's seat forward of it, in the centre line of the car, and so placed that his side vision is less obstructed than with the present arrangement with a passenger directly beside him. At the rear is an extra seat.

Mr Bradshaw states that apparent difficulties in matters such as wheel changing and accessibility could easily be overcome in design, and is confident that the general adoption of cars on such lines would do more than anything else to eliminate serious accidents. So far as potential performance of such a design is concerned, he gives his opinion that the natural stability and perfect weight distribution would make it a suitable basis for either a small racing car, or, suitable powered, a world-record machine.

(I think we were fortunate his ideas did not come to fruition. – Graeme)

- (a) The cash price; and
- (b) If the motor car is registered, the registration number; and
- (c) If the motor car is unregistered the engine number of the vehicle; or the chassis number of the vehicle; or the vehicle identification number; or the registration number (if any) last assigned to the vehicle; or if none of those numbers is reasonably ascertainable, any other number by which the vehicle may be identified.
